- Provide an after-school activity for girls (e.g. school club, sports team, music group, etc.).
- Members should include at least 12 participants of puberty aged girls (10-16) who may have difficulty getting access to period products.
- Must commit to at least one leader attending a one-hour webinar.
- Must commit to sharing feedback, impact stories and photos (where possible) for promotional use by America's Promise Alliance and Always.
